What to hand in prior to the conference



3. About the GA3rd

Before explaining this year's topic, it is essential to understand a couple of important facts regarding the committee itself, its history and some of the previous work the GA3rd has done.

The Third Committee of the United Nations General Assembly (GA3rd), also called the Social, Humanitarian, and Cultural Committee (SOCHUM), was founded in 1945 in reaction to the establishment of the Universal Declaration on Human Rights. With its focus on issues regarding fundamental human rights in the international community, the Third Committee promotes and enforces basic freedom and ideals meant to be enjoyed by the entirety of the international community. These, among others, include the right to life, the expression of cultures, the freedom of political participation, the protection of children's rights, and the promotion of social development.

The committee's goal is to design peaceful settlements for issues within the large spectrum of social, humanitarian, and cultural complications by initiating studies that encourage recommendations for the promotion of international cooperation and fundamental freedoms for all.

4. Explanation of the Topic

a) What are equal opportunities?

Equal opportunities refer to equal accessibility of central social resources for the disabled compared to the non-disabled.

These resources include inclusive education tailored to the specific needs of different disabilities, inclusive architecture of public buildings such as schools, accessibility in public transport, non-discriminatory access to employment and housing.

In addition, freedom from discrimination should be ensured in the disabled's daily lives.

b) Why are they of such importance?

Equal opportunities for the disabled are of great importance since people with disabilities comprise a sizable amount of society (roughly 15%), with increasing numbers.

This group often lacks behind in socioeconomic development compared to the non-disabled, as they need specific measures to ensure the same level of economic participation. They are also among the most vulnerable in extreme situations, most socially isolated, and

most stigmatised groups in society.

c) What has the UN done so far?

The United Nations has most prominently addressed the issue at hand with the introduction of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) in 2006. Furthermore, the UN is active in data collection and analysis, for example with the Washington Group on Disability Statistics Short and Extended Set of Questions. Moreover, projects relating to the tenth goal of the Social Development Goals (reduced inequalities) have also addressed this topic.

d) What are some possible solutions?

The United Nations can take several actions to further ensure equal opportunities for the disabled in society and the labour market. Some of these actions could include promoting the implementation of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD), which is a legally binding treaty that requires all states to ensure equal opportunities for people with disabilities, including employment, or encouraging the participation of organisations of people with disabilities in the implementation and monitoring of disability employment policies and programs to ensure that their perspectives are understood and reflected.

Overall, the UN has an important role to play in improving and further ensuring equal opportunities for people with disabilities. By mobilising resources, advocating for their rights, building capacity, promoting international cooperation, and supporting research and data collection, the UN can ensure that the disabled are treated as equals to able-bodied people in society and the labour market, and that their needs are met.

These are only some examples of further measurements the UN can take. You will very likely come up with more during your own research. Since these are also quite general, feel free to further specify them while writing your draft resolutions!

5. Next Steps

This Committee Guide provides a basis for this years' topic that will be debated and discussed in the Third Committee of the United Nations General Assembly.

We would like to emphasise that the Committee Guide should not be the only foundation for

your research and is not meant to be used as an all-inclusive analysis. Accordingly, this guide serves as a thought-provoking impulse to introduce you to the topic, seeing as you will further acquaint yourselves with information to be well prepared for the discussions and for the debates. This can be done by consulting scholarly materials, international news and more detailed background knowledge. Find out how the nation that you will be representing is currently progressing in ensuring equal opportunities for people with disabilities. What goals has the nation set? What difficulties might the nation be facing? Are there any measures?

All these questions and many more may guide you through your research. However, in order to keep guiding you through this process, we included some useful links down below to make your research easier.

Additionally, it is required from the delegates to send a policy statement and a draft resolution prior to the conference. These documents are of great importance as they will be the base of your work throughout the conference. In a separate mail, we shall explain the details concerning those documents.

Lastly, it is crucial to read this year's Rules of Procedure prior to attending the committee sessions, as they will be the main guideline for your behaviour.
